THE PERSON BEHIND THE POSITION

GET TO KNOW OUR PRINCIPAL ALVIN SIMPSON BY ADELINA FIALLOS



PERSONAL JOURNEY & WORK LIFE:

Growing up in the suburbs of Saint Catherine in Jamaica, six-year-old Alvin Simpson would leave home at 5:00 AM for school. He recalls it as a "simpler" time period, where someone could escape from school conflicts when they headed back home, whereas now people are

overcrowded within it. Jamaicans, he believes, are resilient, respectful, and supportive people.

Family played a major role in shaping Mr. Simpson. His favorite aunt on his father's side taught Latin and introduced him to novels and crossword puzzles. He interacts more with his mother's side of the family since his father's side lives farther away, and his favorite uncle is from his mother's side. His father's side emphasized dedication through education and hard work, while his mother's side expressed fun and non-academic experiences.

When he was 16 years old, Mr. Simpson began working with his uncle renovating houses. He realized the job was not suited for him and decided to go into retail and tech instead. As he got older, he volunteered at a church during summer school, teaching sign language. At one point, he wanted to become a pediatrician because he never liked seeing kids sick. He went to college at 17 for biomedical studies, coincidentally at the same time his mother went to college for nursing. Eventually, he decided not to pursue medical school. Around this time, a friend encouraged him to try education. While doing so, his passion for education consumed him and ultimately led him to where he is today. Teachers had already impacted his love of learning by modeling values of helping and encouraging others. Once his passion settled on teaching, it never changed.

Mr. Simpson worked at Grace Dodge High School, also in the Bronx, before our former principal, Mr. Hernandez, offered him a position as a assistant principal at High School for Teaching and the Professions. One of his first impressions here was when a female student sat and talked with him for an hour, making him feel that T&P was welcoming and helping him recognize the strong sense of community. He believes teachers should not spend their entire class lecturing but should instead help students discover learning for themselves. His biggest accomplishment was taking over an advanced class and moving it from a 0% pass rate to a 20% pass rate on an exam, as students felt a great sense of pride in their success.

Outside of teaching, Mr. Simpson loves visiting museums, hiking, especially in large parks,



and photography. One of his favorite memories is visiting his uncle during the summer to go camping or fishing. ICE OUT OF SCHOOLS

American high schools are often described as melting pots, places where students from many backgrounds come together to learn, grow, and feel a sense of belonging. For many students and families, school is more than a building; it is a safe and trusted space. Recently, however, changes in federal immigration policy have created new fears that are affecting school communities across the country.

For many years, a federal policy known as the "sensitive locations" policy discouraged immigration enforcement, specifically Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) from taking place in schools, places of worship, and hospitals. While this policy was not a total ban, it sent a clear message: students and families should be able to attend school and access essential services without fear of detention or deportation.

That policy has recently been removed and replaced with vague guidance telling agents to use "common sense." Without clear rules, many families no longer feel confident that schools will remain protected spaces. As a result, fear and anxiety have increased in immigrant communities, including right here in New York City. This reality also conflicts with a long-standing Supreme Court ruling, Plyler v. Doe (1982), which guarantees all children in the United States the right to a free public education regardless of immigration status. When fear prevents students from coming to school, that promise is not being fully upheld.

NYC Public Schools (NYCPS) and the Mayor's Office have publicly reaffirmed their commitment to protecting students and families. NYCPS does not allow non-local law enforcement agencies. including ICE, to enter school buildings unless they are legally required to do so. In simple terms:

• ICE is not allowed to enter NYC schools just because they want to.

 School staff do not share information about students or families.

 Any request from ICE or another non-local law enforcement agency must be reviewed by legal counsel first.

If a non-local law enforcement officer ever comes to a school:

- They are asked to wait outside the building.
- The school principal is immediately notified.
- No information about students or families is shared.
- Legal experts at NYCPS review any documents before any action is taken.

The most immediate impact of this change is a loss of trust. The sensitive locations policy reassured families that schools were safe. Without it, fear of family separation can follow students and parents into school buildings. Educators across the city have reported increases in student anxiety and absences. Some families are choosing to keep their children home because they are worried about the possibility of ICE activity nearchools. When students are afraid to attend class, their learning, mental health, and sense of belonging all suffer. 11th grader Salvador Hernandez strongly agrees. "Because ICE is unpredictable and their actions are seemingly unconstitutional, like they act outside of the law with no repercussions, and knowing that they are running around and willing to snatch up anybody who looks and fits their criteria brings a great sense of worry and unease." 12th grader Jeremy Yanes also reported feeling anxious. "They can take anyone who even looks Latino, Latina, and they don't care."

I do not wish to speak with you, answer your questions, or sign or hand you any documents based on my 5th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution.

I do not give you permission to enter my home based on my 4th Amendment rights under the United States Constitution unless you have a warrant to enter, signed by a judge or magistrate with my name on it that you slide under the door.

I do not give you permission to search any of my belongings based on my 4th Amendment rights.

I choose to exercise my constitutional rights.

These cards are available to citizens and noncitizens alike.

Red cards are pocket sized cards that explain individuals' constitutional rights.

Usted tiene derechos constitucionales:

• NO ABRA LA PUERTA si un agente de inmigración está tocando la puerta.

IF ICE SHOWS UP, KNOW YOUR RIGHTS!

If immigration (ICE) comes to your door or stops you in the streets, you have rights!

1. DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR

ICE does not have the right to enter your home without a valid warrant signed by a judge.







ICE will not always identify themselves as ICE. If there is a knock at your door and they say "Police" it could very well be ICE. ICE will often say they are police to gain access to homes. If at any point they try to enter, or do enter, continue to say


"I DO NOT CONSENT".

If they insist they have a warrant ask them to slip it under the door.



Don't run and most importantly do not lie about your name, age, immigration status, etc.

Anything you say or do can be used against you.



If ICE questions you, under the 5th Amendment, you have the right to remain silent and to not incriminate yourself.

2. REMAIN CALM



If you are detained, ask for an immigration attorney immediately. Although immigration does not provide attorneys, once you ask for an attorney they should no longer question you.

3. DO NOT SIGN ANYTHING



Ask to have documents translated. If you do not speak English ask for an interpreter.

Have an attorney look over any documents that ICE gives you.

4. RECORD




If you witness someone being detained by ICE, you have the right to record as long as you do not interfere with the arrest.

Pictures, videos, and any information you can gather, can help verify an immigration raid and also help someone's immigration case.

5. MAKE A FAMILY PLAN



If you have children, identify a caretaker.



Make sure your family is prepared if ICE arrives at your home. Have all your personal documents and finances secure.



Make sure you have at least one number memorized in case of an emergency.

If ICE stops you on the street, you have rights!



1. ICE can only arrest you if they have probable cause that you are in the U.S. without lawful status or are deportable



If ICE approaches you on the street and says your name, before you say anything else, ask "am I free to go?". If ICE says yes but still tries to ask you questions, clearly state: "I don't want to answer your questions" and slowly walk away.

If ICE says you are not free to leave, remember that you have the right to remain silent and not answer any questions about your nationality or immigration status. Clearly state: "I want to exercise my right to remain silent" and then say "I would like to speak to an immigration attorney." Remember to remain calm, do not attempt to resist arrest, and most importantly do not give false information to ICE.



2. Do not give ICE any foreign nationality identity documents unless ICE presents a warrant signed by a judge (this is very rare).

You are not required to present your identification to immigration officials. However if you do decide to show identification, it is best to show identification that does not state your immigration status or country of origin, such as a New York City Identification Card (NYCID) or a New York Driver's License. If ICE demands your passport or national ID card, you do not have to provide it unless ICE has a judicial warrant. If possible, it is best not to carry foreign nationality documents on you.



3. Do not consent to searches.

The 4th Amendment of the Constitution protects you against unreasonable searches and seizures. Sometimes, ICE tries to get around this rule by asking for your consent to search you or your belongings. Remember: if ICE asks for your permission to search or starts searching you without asking, you have the right to say "I do not consent to this search."

4. You have the right to record.

If you are accompanied by someone, ask them to safely record the incident. Make sure that the person recording maintains a safe distance, does not interfere with the arrest, keeps the camera steady and does not talk while recording in order to get clear audio. Do not edit the original copy of the video. If it is not safe to record, make sure to take detailed notes.



5. Plan ahead.

If you are at risk of being stopped by ICE, it is important to create a plan for yourself and your loved ones in advance. Memorize the number of a contact (partner, friend, relative) that you can call in case of an emergency. If you have an immigration attorney, memorize their number. Have a list ready of your medications, allergies, and other important details that your emergency contact can have access to in case you are arrested.

This year T&P partnered with Hunter College to pilot the Youth Educator Program. Select 10th and 11th Grade students apply to the 2-year program where they took one Hunter course per semester and graduate with 12 to 15 credits and their paraprofessional or teacher's aide certification. Students successfully completed their first semester and are presenting their original research on topics like immigration, totalitarianism, and sexual harassment to the larger Hunter community.

- Activities include assisting school events, toy drives, bake sales and organizing school events.


MY BROTHERS KEEPER
